In order to address prescription drug abuse issues in our community, 12 partners collaborated to develop the Prescription Drug Abuse Community Action Group. Among the group's accomplishments thus far has been a prescription drug disposal day, which coincided with a community media campaign.

This presentation focuses on suicide within our culture with a specific focus on Montana. This presentation highlights national and Montana State data, demographics of suicidal individuals, warning signs, risk assessments, training on how to intervene with a suicidal person, evidence-based practices and available resources.

Learning objectives for this presentation include: 1) Participants will be able to identify at least three warning signs of suicide, 2) Participants will know what QPR stands for and 3) Participants will be able to identify at least two suicide prevention resources in the state.

BOILING POINT: The High Cost of Unhealthy Anger to Individuals and Society

There are many indicators in our world today that life is out of balance. Stress related illnesses, addictions of all kinds, wide spread use of anti-depressant medications, lateral violence within racial and ethnic groups and between women, road rage, ADHD (Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder), cults, righteousness, domestic violence, rage, and perhaps most frightening, our children killing our children.

In this presentation, participants will learn the impact of current and historical familial cultural and societal trauma, increased technological advancements, and resulting disconnection of the individuals and families they treat. Also presented are the dynamics of lateral violence and multiple addictions, the most recent studies on the factors contributing to ADHD, the effects of societal desensitization, isolation and operant conditioning.

FROM LEGACY TO CHOICE: Healing the Effects of Generational Trauma and Effects on Individuals, Families and Communities

When generational traumas, such as war, genocide, oppression, poverty, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, physical abuse, death or loss of parents or siblings, residential schools, institutionalization, alcoholism and substance abuse are not grieved and healed by individuals, families and communities, the effects of unresolved trauma are carried into the next generation. Individuals suffer from anniversary dates, cultural identity, low self-esteem, hypervigilance and inability to develop healthy relationships. Families fall victim to communication breakdowns, increased domestic violence and shaming and sexual abuse while healthy rituals for grieving, celebration, and rights of passage are lost. Isolation proceeds to grow among family members. Community members begin to separate from one another and frequently experience increased apathy, substance abuse, trauma and suicide epidemics, primarily among the youth. Signs of lateral violence such as family feuds, religious wars, competitiveness, gossip and bloodism develop between members of the community, furthering the isolation and thus preventing steps toward healing.

When communities begin to understand the effects of generational trauma, a process of validation and healing can begin. Individuals, families and communities can begin a process of empowerment and recovery. In this workshop, in addition to the effect of generational trauma, the resiliency of individuals and the steps necessary for comprehensive healing will be explored.

The focus of this workshop will be on healing; understanding the effects of trauma, feeling the pain, reconnecting with the strength of community and validating the strength of culture and resiliency in individuals, families and communities.

Panel: Restorative Justice Programming as a Resource for the Juvenile Justice System

Presenter: Jen Molloy, Center for Restorative Youth Justice, Executive Director

Restorative Justice Programming has proven to be a promising approach to juvenile justice in Flathead County. This course will detail the innovative programs utilized by the Center for Restorative Youth Justice in addition to illuminating the Center's strengths and discussing its challenges. Restorative Justice emphasizes accountability, competency development, community safety and the inclusion of offenders, victims and community in the justice process.

Panel: Success Stories for the Chippewa Cree Tribal Children's Court

Presenter: Elinor Nault, Master of Arts in Education, Chippewa Cree Tribal Court Administrator, Chippewa Cree Tribal Court

In response to the significant challenges posed by the increased use of drugs, alcohol and violence in our Native American community, the Tribal Courts now provide more than the traditional services related to dispute resolution. Newfound successes in working with juvenile clients can be attributed to recognizing the Judicial Branch as a quasi-independent branch of government. Therefore, we developed a comprehensive and collaborative community-wide strategic plan seeking to merge our Native American culture and traditions with the Western model of curriculum and program activities.

Panel: Juvenile Probation and Social Responsibility Training

Presenter: Tiffani Sherman, Deputy Juvenile Probation Officer

Social Responsibility Training (SRT) is a class offered at Billings West High School for youth who are on probation or returning from long-term suspension. SRT is a cognitive behavioral intervention that is a partnership between the school and the probation office. The class teaches youth about the importance of taking responsibility for their behavior; students learn basic life skills, including how to cope with challenges in life and awareness of the impact of their decision-making. Since beginning SRT, Billings West has seen disciplinary referrals go down and grade point averages, attendance, and student engagement rise.

Panel: Balanced and Restorative Justice Programming

Presenter: Rosalie Roy, Executive Director, Community Restorative Justice, Inc.

Implementation of Balanced and Restorative Justice (BARJ) provides opportunities for youth to take direct responsibility for the harm they create. BARJ also recognizes victims as a key component of justice, views youth as community assets, seeks community partnerships and collaboration in public safety and aims for the healthy development of youth.

Panel: Creating Healthy Communities

Presenter: Kenny Smoker Jr. , Master of Business Administration, Health Program Specialist, Fort Peck Tribes

This presentation focuses on creating healthy communities by empowering youth through the guidance of elders. Also covered are the Harvard Youth Initiative, the journey to healthy communities, community and traditional values, elder involvement and creating partnerships.

Addicted Offenders: Challenges and Opportunities (Aspen)

Presenter: Mona Sumner, Master of Health Administration, American College of Addiction Treatment Administrators Member, Chief Operations Officer, Rimrock Foundation

This session will focus on what it is that constitutes adequate treatment services and what probation and parole officers can reasonably expect and require from probationers and parolees with addiction-related problems. Best monitoring services and methods for producing the optimum response will be addressed. The frustration experienced in supervising these offenders often relates to a failure to understand the disease process and its impact upon the brain, thus making them less accountable. In understanding the limitations, we can better plan our accountability strategies.

How thick should the community/police relationship be to ensure successful crime prevention and response? Whose job is it to engage? Shannon J. Augare is an enrolled Blackfeet member and has spent 6 year in public service, earning a national reputation in developing economic strategies for rural America, family asset building, and community planning. Representative Augare is Chair of the Law and Justice Interim Committee; a member of the Business and Labor Standing Committee; a member of the Federal Relations, Energy, and Telecommunications Standing Committee; and a member of the Rules Standing Committee. Representative Augare also serves as vice-chair of the National Caucus of Native American State Legislators.

Detective Guy Baker Missoula Police Department

Detective Guy Baker is a 19-year veteran of the Missoula Police Department who has played an integral role in working the city's gang presence. Detective Baker has gained a comprehensive knowledge of street gangs through continuous education and has completed hundreds of hours of training at gang conferences and symposiums around the country. Detective Baker is Senior Vice President of the Northwest Gang Investigators Association, Northwest Regional Representative for the Western States Gang Intelligence Network and a member of the California Gang Investigators Association.

Starla Blank, Doctor of Pharmacy Chair, Montana Pharmacy Association

Starla Blank received a Bachelor of Science degree in pharmacy from the University of Montana and a Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Idaho State University. She is a Pharmacy Implementation Manager for VHA, and the Chair of the Montana Pharmacy Association. Starla has worked closely with the Board of Pharmacy and the MBCC in the legislative effort to implement a prescription monitoring program in Montana.

Detective Beth Braun Montana State University Police Department

Beth graduated from Montana State University in 2005 with a degree in Graphic Design and Art Education K-12. She attended the Police Academy in 2005 and was a patrol officer for 3 ½ years. She is a trained Evidence Technician, Sexual Assault Response Team member, Domestic Violence Response Team member, has been involved in the Adopt-A-Cop program since its first year in 2007 and became a detective with the Montana State University Police Department in January 2009.
